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DESCRIPTION OF THE DEGREE PROGRAM

General Objective

Educate language professionals capable of: comprehending the internal characteristics of natural languages and phenomena related to their use; know how to differentiate and be able to obtain different types of linguistic evidence, both originating from oral language (spontaneous speech, dialogues, narrations, etc.) of children and adults, as well as written sources (historical documents, printed contemporary texts, etc.); applying procedures for transcription and analytical techniques to these materials that allow for the identification of normal and abnormal patterns of phonological structuring, morphology, syntax and semantics of languages, as well as to discover possible changes they are undergoing; propose solutions to potential specific language problems and plan products of a linguistic nature based on the analysis of materials studied.

Specific Objectives

The linguistic education acquired from the bachelor's degree program and its areas of concentration, will enable students to address and analyze different kinds of linguistic phenomenon in different communities (social and geographic), in such a way that their results will contribute knowledge of said phenomena and will also serve as a basis for proposing solutions to practical problems related to language, in particular those observed in the fields of mainstream and special education as well as bilingual education.

Study will be directed, as a result, not only toward knowledge of the linguistic phenomenon, but also the application of such knowledge by means of an interdisciplinary and disciplinary orientation that will balance theory and practice, fostering attitudes of social awareness and teamwork in such a way that the graduate is able to undertake activities such as the following:

Take part in designing programs to teach communication skills (speaking, reading, writing, comprehension) in Spanish and other languages.

Prepare basic manuals and teaching aids to teach such skills both to native Spanish speakers as well as those who learn it as a second language.

Contribute to the development of general dictionaries for Spanish and other languages.

Prepare basic descriptive and lexicographic products such as wordbooks and grammar outlines.

Work implementing or providing guidance to educational projects focused on language issues.

Collaborate on research projects focused on the description and analysis of specific languages by studying the processes for first and second language acquisition, development and teaching, conducting linguistic surveys, samplings of linguistic uses, and processing information relevant to those projects.

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Apply linguistic knowledge to practical problems linked to the processes of acquisition, development and teaching of Spanish and the indigenous languages of the region, taking into account both their oral and written scope, and the possible disturbances that may hinder these processes.

Teach communication skills in their mother tongue (be it Spanish or another) at the basic, intermediate and advanced levels of the education system.

WHAT-CAN-YOU-DO-WITH-THIS-DEGREE?

Skills Acquired

Graduates with a Bachelor of Arts in Linguistics from the University of Sonora are professionals essentially trained to describe the structure and functions of natural languages as communication systems and at the same time has the basic education to understand the factors that affect said structure and functions. In other words, they are professionals that in addition to being able to describe the features of human languages, have knowledge of the social, historical, psychological and neurophysiological conditions that influence how individuals and human groups speak.

Professional fields

In special education:

- Contribute in the diagnosis of language acquisition and literacy problems in elementary education.
- Detect language production and reception abnormalities in children.
- Evaluate and participate in the design and execution of rehabilitation therapies for children with language production and reception problems.
- Contribute in the design of educational materials for teaching in special education.

In education directed to indigenous communities:

- Participate in literacy projects and bilingual / bicultural education.
- Prepare printed and audiovisual materials, as well as descriptive and lexicographic indigenous language products, such as grammar outlines, wordbooks and compilations of texts, manuals and activity books.
- Collaborate in the preparation of practical grammar books and bilingual or trilingual dictionaries.
- Contribute to the design of educational programs and materials for the revitalization of indigenous languages, such as teaching aids, radio programs, discussion circles, printed and visual media, etc.

In a legal context:

- Help interpret terms in documents with legal value.

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- Help evaluate verbal evidence brought to trials.

In the context of an internship in other disciplines:

- Help give advice and specialized courses to professionals who require general knowledge and efficient language management, such as communicologists, psychologists, language teachers, lawyers, journalists, etc.
